FROM THE CEO

Thank you for your continued support and advocacy across Shawnee, Douglas, Jackson and Jefferson counties. Whether you donate money or services or goods, whether you share your valuable time with us, or whether you speak up for the work we do or advocate for policy changes that serve everyone in our communities, thank you.

Our staff and volunteers put in so much hard work this year. We issued new grants in Douglas County for family support, childhood success and racial equity. We also continue to support the Eudora Community Navigator position. Shawnee County grantees completed the first year of a two-year grant cycle. Jackson County donors continued to support Basic Needs through grants and started their first book distributions and classroom readings through the Junior Leader Reader program created by our Young Leaders Society.

In addition, we've continued to expand capacity for all nonprofits in our four-county region through professional development and volunteer management and coordination. We offered Board Leadership Training twice and experimented with a new nonprofit professional development opportunity in Lawrence focused on supporting volunteers during the week of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. We continue to speak up for our sector in front of our local, state and national legislators whenever the opportunity presents, including with our United Ways of Kansas colleagues on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC.

This is just a tiny sampling of the community-building work you made possible. I continue to be amazed at the incredible leadership of our staff and volunteers to make such a great impact on our community. We truly are better together.

In 2025, we will implement an updated strategic plan. We have taken a lot of time and thought deeply about what we are, how far we've come, where we want to be in the future, and what our communities need most from us. A changing philanthropic landscape and evolving community needs require us to be more nimble, bolder, and to take some risks. We can't keep doing things the same way just because that's how we've always done it. We recognize and appreciate our traditional role as grant makers, but we also need to invest in ourselves as connectors and convenors. We need to ensure we have a dependable foundation that will allow us to support the broader community for decades to come. We know the possibilities are endless, and I am so excited to see how far we go, together, in the coming year. United is the way we get things done.


The Common Misconception

The Hidden Reality



For a growing number of Kansas households, financial stability is nothing more than a pipe dream, no matter how hard their members work. These households are **ALICE – Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed – earning above the Federal Poverty Level yet struggling to afford basic expenses. Because many assistance programs based their eligibility on federal poverty guidelines, they often exclude the struggling ALICE population.**

ALICE households:

- Span all races, ages, ethnicities, and abilities, though households of color are disproportionately ALICE
- Include workers whose wages cannot keep up with the rising cost of goods and services
- Often include those who are working two or more jobs and still cannot pay their bills
- Include family members who need care and assistance, which makes it harder for their caregivers to find adequate work
- Live paycheck to paycheck and are forced to make impossible choices: pay the rent or buy food, receive medical care or pay for child care, pay utility bills or put gas in the car
- Are part of every UWKV community

When we collaborate and advocate for change in all our impact areas, we do so with everyone below the ALICE threshold in mind, including people living in poverty.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

Shawnee County Impact Area: Childhood Success

Why we work in Childhood Success

Investment in early childhood is crucial for the success of individuals and families in our community. Success in the early years leads to better preparation for school, greater academic success, and on-time high school graduation. Investment in early childhood provides supports for families and can drive economic growth in communities.

Often, systems focus on either parents/caregivers or on children. Rarely do they focus on both generations. Our aim is to invest in areas that are both child-focused and parent/caregiver-focused with a view to integrating services through partnerships and collaboration. Our investment in Childhood Success is informed by, and aligns with, the Blueprint for Early Childhood and Common Measures Initiative for the state of Kansas.

What we do in Childhood Success

In addition to granting dollars to community partners, UWKV also:

- Administers **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library** in Shawnee County in partnership with the Topeka & Shawnee County Public Library, bringing a free book every month to Shawnee County children from birth to age 5.
- Coordinates the **Junior Reader Leader** early literacy volunteer program through UWKV's Young Leaders Society.
- Builds **Born Learning Trails** that encourage caregiver/child literacy-building interaction and physical activity.
- Coordinates the **Aleshire Venture Grant** learning partnership with the Washburn University Center for Leadership and Collaboration (\$10,000 in grants from a UWKV Tocqueville donor annually to benefit children from prenatal to age 5). UWKV staff work with WU leadership students to teach the process of impact grant-making.
- Coordinates grant collaboratives for the **Kansas Preschool Pilot** and the **Early Childhood Block Grant**, managing millions of dollars in grants and providing backbone support for dozens of grantees.

Shawnee County Impact Area: Family Success

Why we work in Family Success

Families in our community, particularly those from historically under-resourced communities, face a series of barriers to achieving success and economic stability and mobility. Systems are not integrated and create barriers for families seeking services. Often, systems focus on either parents/caregivers or on children. Rarely do they focus on both generations. Our aim is to invest in areas that are both child-focused and parent/caregiver-focused with a view to integrating services through partnerships and collaboration.

What we do in Family Success

In addition to granting dollars to community partners, UWKV also:

- Convenes the **Shawnee County Whole Family Coalition**, which encourages participants, including UWKV impact grant partners, to craft wraparound solutions to support all household members
- Supports **Kansas 211**, the 24-hour referral service administered by United Way of the Plains
- Provides space and backbone support to **LiveWell Shawnee County**, a grassroots community health coalition that mobilizes people, ideas and resources to address local needs.
- Participates in the **Homelessness Task Force** and the **Community Health Improvement Plan** process

Shawnee County Impact Area: Family Supports

Why we work in Family Supports

Our investment in family supports recognizes that individuals and families often struggle to meet the basic needs of their household. Often, families present to local programs with immediate needs, and it is important to provide for those needs. However, these needs are likely related to complex issues that require assessment and wraparound services that help deal with the root causes for these individuals and families. Our aim is to invest in programs that work together to meet the needs of individuals and families while also addressing root causes through collaboration and resource referrals to help clients achieve greater outcomes.

What we do in Family Supports

In addition to granting dollars to community partners, UWKV also:

- Brings **diapers, wipes and other baby supplies** into the community as a national partner with **Baby2Baby**
- With the help of volunteers, serves more than 1,000 households annually through the **Shawnee County Christmas Bureau, with an economic impact of more than \$200,000**
- Partners with **Washburn Tech** to find a recipient for a **Recycled Rides** vehicle through a collaboration with the National Auto Body Council

Community Resource Navigation in Douglas County

Currently UWKV employs a full-time Community Navigator in Eudora (Douglas County). This navigator builds and maintains relationships with local partners and is a connection resource for anyone needing services in that community. Navigators reduce the burden on nonprofit agency staff by helping clients prepare documentation and complete applications before handing them off for assistance. In the coming years UWKV plans to significantly expand the number of Navigators serving Shawnee/Jefferson and Douglas County.

Why we work in Family Stabilization

This year, UWKV offered interim grants to organizations that had received UWKV grants in the previous year to help bridge the gap before the merged organization was able to reformulate and align its approach to community impact in Douglas County.

What do we do in Family Stabilization

In addition to granting dollars to community partners, UWKV also:

- Participates in the **Douglas County Guaranteed Income Pilot**, exploring and gathering community input on options to improve the financial stability of single moms with a guaranteed income payment
- Participates in the **Community Health Improvement Plan** process
- Contributes to the annual Douglas County **Back2School Supply Drive**
- Brings **diapers, wipes and other baby supplies** into the community as a national partner with **Baby2Baby**

Douglas County Impact Area: Racial Equity

UWKV racial equity grants support projects that build community, leadership and direct supports for all marginalized community groups. Funds are invested in grassroots and/or community nonprofit organizations for projects that increase equity and opportunity. These grants provide support for organizations or individuals whose work benefits people with low incomes, communities of color, and historically and/or systematically marginalized people. We especially look for partners that:

- are led by Black, Indigenous, People of Color and focus on elevating and increasing equity.
- take a multi-generational approach that prioritizes youth and families.
- align with United Way's mission of building healthy and resilient communities, facilitated by equitable access to quality education, healthcare, jobs, housing, food and community engagement.

Douglas County Impact Area: Early Childhood Education/Childcare

Why we work in Early Childhood Education/Childcare

Since the Covid pandemic, more families and individuals are struggling to with rising prices and demand for early childhood education and childcare services. This year, UWKV offered interim grants to organizations that had received UWKV grants in the previous year to help bridge the gap before UWKV was able to reformulate and align its approach to community impact in Douglas County. These grants were meant to provide immediate, short-term childcare and/or early childhood education assistance,

Grants were available for general program support, including indirect administrative costs such as supplies, organizational and/or staff expenses related to childcare and/or early childhood education.

Ballard Center: Grant funds were used to fill the gap between tuition received and the cost to operate their early childhood education program.

Community Children’s Center: Support for the Early Education Tuition Scholarship Program, which provides short-term assistance for families experiencing crisis due to unexpected circumstances.

Positive Bright Start: These funds will be used as a local cash match for the Douglas County Early Childhood Block Grant, with a specific focus on providing scholarships for Black and Brown families.

Jackson County Impact Area: Family Supports

Why we work in Family Supports

Our investment in family supports recognizes that individuals and families often struggle to meet the basic needs of their household. Our neighbors in Jackson County face additional barriers common to rural communities, including fewer local service options, transportation challenges, and fewer employment opportunities. Family Support investment in Jackson County comes directly from Jackson County donors and workplace campaigns, and Jackson County volunteers help guide investment decisions. In 2024, your dollars served more than 3,000 people, providing food; access to dental, medical and mental health care; and short-term rent and utility assistance.

What we do in Family Supports

In addition to granting dollars to community partners, UWKV also:

- Brings **diapers, wipes and other baby supplies** into the community as a national partner with **Baby2Baby**
- Invests Jackson County donor dollars in the Jackson County Christmas Bureau
- Provides a matching grant for the **Jackson County Community Foundation's Washburn Tech** scholarship program, which helps students attending technical education classes pay for equipment and other expenses.
- Coordinates **Junior Leader Reader** opportunities at Jackson County elementary schools, bringing volunteers into classrooms to read and provide free books to students.

CAPACITY BUILDING

Simply put, capacity building is helping nonprofits help more people by making parts of their work easier. United Way of Kaw Valley builds capacity for our nonprofit ecosystem through monetary help, training and development, volunteer recruitment and management and providing structure and support for collaborations and coalitions.

Unrestricted Donor Designations

Donors can choose to send all or part of their United Way donation (minimum of \$50) to aligned local nonprofits. United Way of Kaw Valley does not restrict these dollars, and there are no reporting requirements. Designations do not affect the amount of impact grant dollars a partner may also receive.

Professional Development for the Nonprofit Community

UWKV understands the challenges of finding the time and money to allow nonprofit staff to learn new skills and expand their personal and professional development. We actively seek to create affordable development opportunities. These include a short seminar before our annual volunteer expo, serving staff who are there to table at the event, and our MLK Day of Service seminar that focuses on nonprofit capacity building and volunteer management topics. In the coming year we will be adding collaboration and training centered on successful storytelling.

Fiscal Agency and Backbone Support

UWKV is uniquely positioned to support large or small coalitions and provide structure and support for local and regional collaborations. Those collaborations include the Early Childhood Block Grant, the Kansas Preschool Pilot and LiveWell Shawnee County (formerly Heartland Healthy neighborhoods).

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT & MANAGEMENT

UWKV administers this powerful digital volunteer management portal, offering free access to community agencies and organizations across our service area. Built on the Galaxy Digital platform, KawValleyVolunteers.org provides free volunteer recruitment, management and communication tools for organizations and free volunteer matching and signup for individuals. UWKV also provides technical support for anyone needing assistance or looking to maximize their use of this tool.

Board Leadership Training

Offered in summer and winter, Board Leadership Training serves 30-40 participants per session. Over the 9-hour, 2-morning course, diverse community participants learn the basic functions and responsibilities of nonprofit board members. The course is designed to engage and educate current and future board volunteers and prepare them for effective service.





